A 6-year-old New Berlin girl died at 6:35 a.m. Sunday at Memorial Hospital from head injuries sustained Saturday night when the auto in which she was riding was rammed from behind by a car on Ill. 29 in Cantrill. The victim, Karen Lynn Krueger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Karl A. Krueger of R.R. 1, New Berlin, never regained consciousness following the accident, according to Coroner W. C. Telford. KAREN, a first grade student at Pleasant Plains, was a passenger in an auto driven by her grandfather, Lloyd Coomer of R.R. 5.

They were driving from a sausage sale at the Methodist Church in Cantrill when Coomer's auto, northbound on Rt. 29, attempted to make a left turn and was hit from behind by an auto driven by Charles Deckert, 33, of Greenville. THE BODIES of the victims were taken to Stiel-Dawson Funeral Home at Nokomis. Mrs. Hill is survived by her husband and daughter; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Grimes of Ocoee; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Grimes of Nokomis; two sisters, Mrs. Cora Olinger of Assumption and Miss Wanda Ann Grimes of Nokomis; and brothers, James and Francis, both of Chicago.

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## DeGaulle Sweeps To Victory

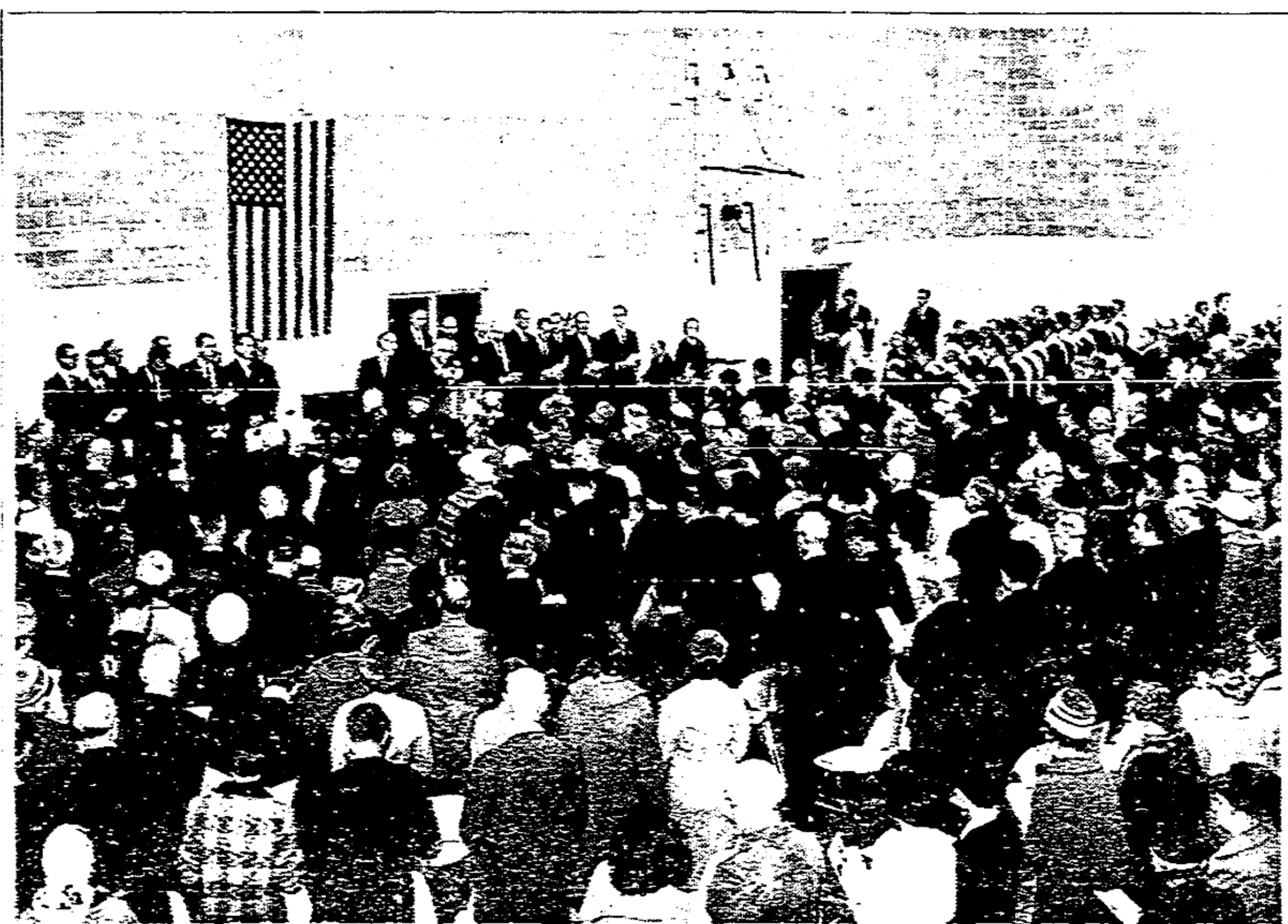
### Party Gets Most Seats Ever Won

PARIS (AP)—French voters gave President Charles de Gaulle a ringing victory in Sunday's national elections as the Union for a New Republic—the main pillar of Gaullist support—captured the largest number of seats ever won by a single party in the French National Assembly.

### Adenauer Supporters Victorious

MUNICH, Germany (UPI)—Supporters of embattled West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer scored an unexpected victory today in the Bavarian state elections. The gains were relatively small, but Adenauer's backers had been expected to lose ground because of the security crackdown furor involving his defense minister, Franz-Josef Strauss.

With 90 per cent of the Sunday's votes counted, official returns showed Adenauer's supporters, and the opposition Socialists both advancing at the expense of small splinter parties. The results showed Adenauer's Christian Social Union (CSU) backers climbed from the 45 per cent of the vote they received in the last state elections in 1952 to 50 per cent. The Socialists rose from 30.5 per cent to 34.9 per cent. Five smaller parties were losing support and dividing up 17.1 per cent of the vote.

### Judd Talks At YMCA Dedication

More than 1,000 persons attended dedication ceremonies for the new YMCA building Sunday. Dr. Walter H. Judd, Republican congressman from Minnesota gave the dedicatory address. As one who preached the threat of communism in China during the early 1950's after a tour as a medical missionary there, Dr. Judd Sunday contrasted life under Communist totalitarian rule to the conditions of living in the society created by American democracy.

HE CALLED the YMCA program the essence of what is meant by "American freedom of activity."

Dr. Judd, a graduate of the University of Nebraska, went to South China as a medical missionary in 1925 under the auspices of the Congregational Church. He returned to America in 1932 and received a fellowship in surgery at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. In 1934 he returned to Asia to head a 125-bed hospital until 1938. He is completing his 10th year as a U.S. congressman. He lost his congressional seat to a Democrat in a recent redistricting battle.

THE NEW "Y" building, located at 4th and Cook streets, was opened Friday.

Facilities in use include the youth lounge, game room, craft room, youth department offices, youth shower and locker room, staff offices and workroom, a portion of the adult area showers and locker rooms, physical conditioning rooms, several club rooms, the all purpose room, two handball courts and the gymnasium. The needs of teen-agers and younger boys have been emphasized in the areas now open, officials said, but this has not meant a curtailment of adult programs.

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## Russia Reported Still Conducting Atom Tests

GENEVA (UPI)—Western sources said Sunday Russia still is conducting nuclear tests at the rate of one every two days despite Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's recent statement that the Soviet tests would end by Nov. 20.

THE WESTERN report darkened the mood among diplomats on the eve of the resumption of the 17-nation disarmament negotiations here. In Moscow there was no comment on the Western report that Soviet tests were continuing. A day after a 10-week recess, Dur-

U.S. NEGOTIATOR Arthur H. Dean and Soviet representative Semyon K. Tsarapkin, as co-chairmen of the 17-nation committee, met for more than an hour Sunday afternoon to iron out last-minute procedural arrangements.

THE U.N. General Assembly has called for a halt to all nuclear testing by Jan. 1, and there had been cautious optimism that some sort of test ban agreement might emerge from the talks by Christmas.

THIS OPTIMISM was based on the belief that the Cuban and India-Chinese crises may have increased Soviet willingness to work for a treaty in the interest of lessening international tensions. The edge was taken off the optimistic mood somewhat by the report from highly authoritative Western sources that Russia still is testing in its Arctic proving grounds.

### Air Force Rebels Flee

## Revolt In Guatemala Crushed

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala (UPI)—Troops loyal to President Miguel Ydigoras Fuentes put down an air force revolt Sunday after three hours of fierce air-to-ground fighting. The government blamed the revolt on "Castro Communists." At least two civilians were killed, and scores were injured. The presidency announced that the three principal chiefs of the abortive revolt fled by airplane, probably to El Salvador. ALL were air force colonels. FOR NEARLY THREE hours five Mustang fighters and three medium bombers made repeated bombing and strafing swoops over infantry garrisons in and around the capital, police headquarters and the presidential residence. A statement from the presidency said anti-aircraft guns had shot down one of the insurgent fighter planes. The statement said "Castro Communists" organized the revolt and were able to obtain support only from the air force. It warned them the government "is ready to repel any other at-



tempt to disrupt public order." The government also warned that any radio station which broadcasts "treasonous" news will be closed. It ordered radio and cable companies to submit outgoing press dispatches to the government. The three rebel chiefs, who issued an early morning ultimatum to Ydigoras Fuentes to surrender, were identified as Colonel Carlos Marroquin, Jose Gonzales Batres and Manuel Asturias Sobral. AIR FORCE infantry security troops at the airbase here hung up white parachutes denoting surrender shortly after noon as loyal infantry troops surrounded the base. The loyal troops dropped mortar rounds onto the runway to put the airfield out of commission. An undisclosed number of air force officers, mainly pilots, were arrested. The security troops were disarmed and ordered to their barracks. There was no report of damage to the Casa Crema, Ydigoras' official residence, from which he commanded defense operations. Police headquarters was destroyed by bombing. A defense ministry official said there was no fighting in the interior. A check of civil hospitals showed two dead from shrapnel wounds and scores injured. A military spokesman said there was not a single military casualty, although residents saw ambulances make repeated trips from the attacked garrisons to nearby hospitals. The diving rebel aircraft used rockets, machine guns and bombs. Loyal troops answered back with machine gun and anti-aircraft fire. Shrapnel sprinkled residential areas. Thousands of citizens watched the aerial action from windows and rooftops. THE DEFENSE ministry indicated the rebel leaders were ultra-nationalists. Guatemalan sources in Washington said the three rebel colonels represented right-wing interests which opposed the government's decision to undertake land and income tax reform measures. The U.S. State Department in Washington said the U.S. embassy in Guatemala had reported one American, at least, had received a flesh wound from flying shrapnel. She was identified as Mrs. Philip F. Snare, of Buffalo, N.Y., wife of an embassy official.

## Man Fatally Shot On Hunting Trip

A Springfield man, the father of five children, was killed while hunting on a farm near Butler Sunday when a shotgun held by his 11-year-old son accidentally fired.

The tragedy marked the second death of a Springfield resident due to the accidental firing of a shotgun in three days.

The victim, E. James Kulek, 37, of 2123 N. 22nd St. was dead by the time authorities arrived on the scene.

AUTHORITIES SAID he and his sons, Donald, 11, and Ronald, 10, were hunting on the farm of Fred Duncheon. Donald was handling the 12 gauge weapon to his father when it discharged, hitting Kulek in the stomach.

The two-shot weapon had been fired once before the boy handed the gun to his father.

The boys then ran to the Duncheon farm and notified authorities; however, when the Patton Ambulance arrived on the scene, Kulek was dead.

Montgomery County Coroner James Bolton set the time of death at approximately 12:15 p.m.

The body was taken to the Kilim and Egan Funeral Home here. THE EARLIER shooting occurred Friday when six-year-old Arthur Gentry Jr. was killed at his home by a blast from a shotgun held by his brother, Stanley, 12.

Surviving Kulek in addition to his sons are his wife, Mary; an-

other son, John; two daughters, Jean Ann and Patricia Ann; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Kulek Sr., Springfield; two brothers, Stanley Jr. and Francis, both of Springfield; two sisters, Miss Helen Kulek and Mrs. Constance Fargas, both of Springfield and several nieces and nephews.

Kulek, who was born in Springfield, served in the Army in World War II. He was employed by Stanley Kulek and Sons, General Contractors.

Funeral services will be at 9 a.m. Wednesday at St. Aloysius Church, Rt. Rev. Msgr. A. J. Bertman officiating. Burial will be in Calvary Cemetery.
