




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Guadalupe County celebrates spirit of teamwork in economic development

(Seguin) -- Guadalupe County is celebrating what some describe as a "team sport" in the recruitment and relocation of businesses to the area. The Guadalupe County Commissioners Court on Tuesday proclaimed the upcoming week May 9-15 as Economic Development Week.

County officials say economic developers promote economic well-being and quality of life for their

communities by creating and retaining jobs that facilitate growth, support workforce development, enhance wealth, and provide a stable tax base.

EDC representatives from Seguin, Schertz and Cibolo were all on hand for the recognition.

Leading the statements at the podium was Josh Schneuker, executive director for the Seguin Economic Development Corporation. Schneuker says it really takes the efforts of everyone to get a deal done.

"It takes teamwork to get deals done and we are very happy that you all are a strong member of our economic development team and I think all of us here today are kind of symbolizing that economic development is a team sport so what's good for Seguin is going to be good for Schertz and Cibolo and vice versa."

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Seguin ISD to close out the school year with a couple of changes to its calendar

(Seguin) – If you have a student enrolled in the Seguin ISD, then you will want to take note of some important changes that have recently been made in the current school calendar.

The first change is a half day schedule for all students. That means all students will be dismissed at noon on Friday, May 21.

The second change also pushes up the last day of school by one day.

The last day of school was originally Friday, June 11. Now, the last day of school in the Seguin ISD is Thursday, June 10.

During his recent virtual Town Hall Meeting with parents, Seguin ISD Superintendent Dr. Matthew Gutierrez shared a few more details behind these two changes.

"This means just a little bit less school. We have some minutes banked because we didn't use them and so we have made the decision to hold a student half day on Friday, May the 21st. This is going to give our teachers an opportunity to have that afternoon for a workday, to catch up on grading, organizing classrooms, to regroup — This is a very challenging time of



the school year during a very challenging school year and keep in mind that we are ending later than usual as our last day of school was scheduled for June 11 so that day is going to be dedicated to teachers just having some time that they are going to need that time of year but the last day of school has moved to June 10th so please make sure you notate those changes. We wanted to give our parents plenty of time to arrange for childcare," said Gutierrez.

The Seguin ISD also extends a community reminder about this year's graduation date. This year's graduation ceremony will be held at 8 p.m. Friday, June 11 at Matador Stadium. For years, the high school graduation ceremony has been held on a Saturday.

So, I really just want to thank you today for your support of economic development. I also would like to thank all of our partners here today as well as from around the county for all the hard work that they do to really make this place a wonderful place to live, work and play," said Schneuker.

Next in line was Adrian Perez, of the Schertz Economic Development Corporation. "As we come out post pandemic and our country recovers and our state recovers, we are seeing more and more companies look at the state of Texas – finding a place where personal freedom, business friendliness, a focus on private investments so that we can all prosper is really what they are seeing and what they are being attracted to and when they come to Texas, they are seeing communities that partner with the same philosophy, with the same concepts in mind and they find communities, counties and cities working together so that they can be a success," said Perez.

Also thanking the court was Dustin Morris, the business retention and expansion specialist for the Cibolo EDC.

Guadalupe County Judge Kyle Kutscher says he is thankful for each of the EDC's in the county and looks forward to seeing their success continue.

"We would not be able to accomplish success stories that we have had in the past without the hard work from each of the individual cities. We know that without the EDC's and all of their staff and everybody working every day, tirelessly trying to accomplish the goals that we have all laid out, these things would not have happened. As a county, we are very proud to be partners with you, but we understand we don't carry the heavy load often times in a lot of these economic development conversations. We want to improve our position. We want to be more active. We want to help with more additional resources and I think we are moving in that right direction but we also understand the real focus is within the cities and even when there are prospects that look to locate outside of cities, all of you have come to our aid and worked with us in the same respect as if it was in the city limits and we truly, truly appreciate that," said Kutscher.

In addition to the week of recognition, a signed proclamation was also ordered by the commissioner's court. It applauds all the economic development efforts that have helped both small and large companies make significant capital investments throughout the county and that have helped create jobs for all residents.

TLU professor picks up prestigious statewide honor

(Seguin) -- Texas Lutheran University is home to one of the top 10 superior professors in the state of Texas.

The Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation has named TLU Physics Department Chair Dr. Toni D. Sauncy one of its 2021 Piper Professor honorees.

Founded in 1950 by Randall Gordon Piper and his wife, Minnie Stevens Piper, the foundation serves their dream of encouraging young minds and intellectual achievement. The Piper Professor Awards began in 1958 with eight recipients and the roster includes outstanding professors from two and four-year colleges and universities, public and private.

Ashlie Ford, director of marketing and communications for TLU says Sauncy is one of only 10 college professors in Texas to be selected for her superior teaching and for having a profound influence on students at the university level.

"The Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation selects only 10 professors each year, so this award is really an honor because it is directly tied to superior teaching and for the influence that a professor has on students at the university level. Dr. Sauncy is our ninth Piper recipient. She joins the ranks of other professors like Dr. Doug Boyer; Dr. Annette Citzler; Dr. Tiffiny Sia; Dr. Norm Beck so some very impressive work has been done and we are honored that she has made this list and representing



TLU at this level," said Ford.


To be eligible, candidates must be nominated through the President's Office of their university and participation is by invitation only.

Ford says Sauncy has more than earned the recognition.

"Dr. Sauncy is very well known for how hands on she is with her students and working one on one with them, she chairs the physics department. She chairs many different physics related groups. She serves on the Council on Undergraduates Research and she has taught at various levels for the last 22 years. She's a proud first-generation college student. She's also the first in her family to graduate from high school so I know this award is very special but it's also very special to us because we do know how important working with student is to Dr. Sauncy and I echo the sentiments of President (Debbie) Cottrell and our Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Sarah Ferguson that this significant honor is not just for her but it is truly for TLU because it is an award that recognizes a professor's work

with her students so we could not be more proud to have Dr. Sauncy receive this honor," said Ford.

The prestigious recognition includes a \$5,000 award, and Sauncy is the ninth TLU professor to receive the honor. Other previous TLU Piper Professors include: Professor of Christianity and Philosophy Adolph Streng; Associate Professor of Education Helen Weiss; Associate Professor of Science Evelyn Streng and Professor of Physical Education Kathy Yandell.

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



Dr. Thomas Joseph "Tom" Cody aka "Grandpa on the Lake", age 77 of McQueeney, Texas, passed away Saturday, April 17th, 2021 at Guadalupe Regional Medical Center (GRMC) where he worked as a Radiologist for 30 years.

Born on the 4th of July in 1943 in Sioux City, Iowa to Jack and Harriet Cody, Tom came into this world with a bang and never stopped dazzling his friends, family, and acquaintances with his sparkling smile and personality. Although his grand finale came much too soon, Tom will always

be remembered as a bright, shimmering light in this world.

Tom's family moved to Yankton, South Dakota when he was 15. Growing up, Tom was known as "TJ" or "Little Cody" or "THOMAS JOSEPH!" when he was really in trouble with his mother or father. As a 6-foot tall freshman in high school, Tom was a powerhouse on the Yankton Bucks varsity football team and graduated in 1962. He got his undergraduate degree from and attended 2 years of medical school at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. He then transferred to the University of Texas Health Science Center (UTHSC) in San Antonio and graduated with a medical degree followed by a residency in Radiology. He returned to teach at UTHSC in the 1970's and once more after retiring from GRMC.

Tom was always a hard worker, but his high school Chemistry teacher Mr. Halstad and Dr. Steele both of Yankton, South Dakota were instrumental in helping him realize he could do anything he set his mind to, including becoming a physician. From that point on, Tom approached everything he did in life with passion, precision, and determination. He taught himself how to sail, he became a pilot, and he even raced mountain bikes with his son and daughter, winning several races including an off-road triathlon. He was often seen riding his bike in and around McQueeney and Seguin, but his favorite route to ride and run was always the loop around Treasure Island, where he lived for 45 years. He took up ballroom dancing in 2013 telling his wife Stella that "dance lessons were much cheaper and more fun than couple's therapy". They even ended up dancing in the New Braunfels performance of the Nutcracker that year.

He joined the staff as a radiologist at Guadalupe Valley Hospital in Seguin, Texas (now GRMC) in 1975 and retired 30 years later on July 26, 2006, which was declared "Dr. Tom Cody Day" by then mayor Betty Ann Matthies in a ceremony honoring his decades of service to the community.

In the mid 1980's he converted a small church next to the hospital into a private practice and purchased the first mammogram machine for the community. He also helped transform the radiology department at GRMC during that time by convincing the hospital to acquire an ultrasound machine. In addition, he provided radiology services to Warm Springs Rehabilitation Hospital in Gonzales as well as hospitals in Lockhart and Luling, flying his small single engine airplane to these nearby communities to cover more ground in less time.

Tom grew up hunting in South Dakota with his father and brothers and shared that passion with his grandsons, who now carry on the tradition at the Diamond Half Ranch, the same ranch he hunted on for decades with friends and family.

He started focusing on his health in the 1970s and took up running before running shoes were even available. He bought a Vitamix in the 1990s and would make raw vegetable soup and smoothies for many of his meals for years. In fact, it was common knowledge that you'd need to BYOF (bring your own food) to Grandpa's house if you wanted anything unhealthy to eat! As health conscious as

he was, he had a weakness for pie and it was not uncommon for him to polish one off in its entirety (after a long run or ride, of course).

He loved traveling with his family including numerous ski trips to Colorado, Universal Studios and other theme parks, many trips to Alaska, several cruises and sailing adventures including an epic trip to the Bahamas in the 1970s.

He was also blessed with incredible luck, which apparently runs in the family according to his brother Jim. He once had to cram for an important exam in medical school and only had time to review 2 of the 10 possible questions and the two he studied happened to be the questions on the exam! In addition, he won the Yankton Rocky Mountain Elk Chapter gun raffle both times he entered it. He and his family also narrowly escaped certain death in the early 1980's on their way to South Dakota in Tom's single engine Cessna. After the pilot he'd hired flew into a terrible storm just north of Austin, the clouds parted and the pilot landed safely. Needless to say, that flight to South Dakota did not happen that year!

Tom treated everyone equally, never judging them by their past, status or circumstance. He was always willing to help friends and family especially in times of crisis, including offering medical advice that ultimately saved his nephew's life. In the words of his dear friend Dr. Howard Solomon, "he would have moved mountains for me".

His memory will live on as his children and grandchildren share his love for the outdoors, adventure, health and fitness, and most of all...pie. He is preceded in death by his parents, Jack and Harriet Cody, his brother Michael Cody, as well as his pet deer Bambo and cat Priscilla.

Survivors include his loving wife of 33 years Stella Cody; son, J.T. Cody and wife Sanaa; daughters, Rebecca "Becca Boo Baby" Cody and husband Divit Tripathi, and Jessica Guerrero; grandsons, Kellen Cody, Casey Cody, Connor Cody, Bodhi Tripathi, and Chander Tripathi; siblings, Rita Marschall of Reno, Nevada; James (Judy) Cody of Vermillion, South Dakota; Julie (Jerry) Wenner of Park City, Utah; Patrick (Denise) Cody of Yankton; and Nicholas Cody of Yankton, sister in law Mary Dell Cody as well as numerous nieces, nephews, and many friends and colleagues including Dr. Howard Solomon and Dr. Daryl Currier.

Tom requested a small private celebration that will be held on his birthday, which was always a joyous day of celebration with his family. 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
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Warfield


"Jon Jon" was preceded in death by his father.

Medical Expert Says "Ground Game" Important In Remaining Race To **Vaccinate**

(Providence, RI) -- A top public health expert is emphasizing the "ground game" in the remaining part of the race to get Americans vaccinated. On ABC's This Week, Brown University's Dr. Ashish Jha [[jah]] says the key is to make the vaccine as easy to get as possible so everyone can be vaccinated. He says moré shots need to get into walk-in clinics and doctor's offices. Dr. Jha says with the virus still raging globally and the possibility that new variants could still develop, unvaccinated people are especially at risk for COVID-19. Jha says the goal should be to get at least 70 to 80 percent of American adults vaccinated.

WH Chief Of Staff: Admin Pushes To Make Getting **COVID Vaccine Easier**

(Washington, DC) -- The White House is promoting more ways for Americans to get their COVID-19 vaccine. Speaking on CBS's Face The Nation, Chief of Staff Ron Klain says 40-thousand pharmacies have vaccination doses in hand, and many have walk-in hours. He added that a new text line also allows people to find out where there are locations to get vaccinated near your home. Klain says the vaccination rollout continues at a great pace, as one in ten Americans got a shot in the last ten days, but a return to normalcy. there is work left to do.

Governor New York State Has Lowest COVID-19 **Positivity Rate In Six Months**

(Undated) -- The COVID-19 positivity rate in New York state drops to its lowest level in the last six months. Governor Jared Polis's amended mask Andrew Cuomo released the state's latest rules do allow for unmasked coronavirus figures Sunday, and of the indoor gatherings of more than slightly more than 191-thousand test results reported Saturday, just under one-pointfive percent were positive. 



Q: Why don't my snapdragons grow well indoors? I have them under a grow light.

All my Internet sources emphasized the need for direct sunlight. Snapdragons (the dwarf variety) will do well if they have six to eight hours of



direct sunlight daily. Even with that, Homeguides.sfgate. com suggests that it is best to increase this by using a grow light also. Most people do not have a window that receives sun for that amount of time, so lack of sunlight is the answer to your question. To tell the truth, the only plants I am able to grow indoors are orchids, African violets, and spathiphylum. All of them live in windows on the east side of my house, and the orchids are also under grow lights.

How can I keep tomato hornworms and other bugs off of my tomatoes organically?

You can do this by playing an active role in your garden. I walk out every morning and check my tomato plants. I remove the bugs by hand, then smoosh them with a brick or throw them in a bucket of soapy water. One of our old time area gardeners always said that the best bug deterrent in your garden was your shadow. (In other words, you should be out there every day checking before an infestation can take over).

Besides hand-picking insects, Doug Welsh in his Texas Garden Almanac suggests using a high-pressure water spray. Also, once your fruit sets, cover your plants with netting. Another way to control insects is by using trap crops, but I haven't had much luck with them. I planted marigolds one year but did not notice any fewer bugs. I have sprayed with insecticidal soap. Be sure to check the label of your organic product to make sure that it is safe to spray on vegetables. FYI: Keep those birdbaths full. With our intermittent rainfall, birds, bees, and butterflies need all the help they can get.

Q: I have already been bitten by an Asian lady beetle. Are they a good bug or a bad bug?

They are basically beneficial insects to farmers and gardeners because they feed on aphids that can damage plants. The University of Minnesota Extension says that the Asian lady beetle or Harmonia axyridis is also known as the Halloween lady beetle and the Japanese lady beetle. The color of the beetle ranges from orange to yellow to red and to black. Usually the beetle has 19 spots with a black M-shaped marking behind its head.

The beetle can become a pest when it tries to get inside, but it does not infest wood, destroy fabrics, eat food or damage property. They also cannot sting and do not carry disease according to UMN. What they do, however, is bite which can be uncomfortable. They also secrete a smelly yellowish liquid from the joints of their legs, and, when they run out of aphids, will eat fall-ripening fruit such as grapes, apples and fall raspberries. Extension.umn.edu suggests picking up damaged apples and removing damaged fruit from the tree.
