

Local non-profit continues its crusade to save lives

Precious Life unveils the ugly truth behind suicide

(Seguin) - September is Suicide Prevention Month, and a local group is doing its part to help bring to light the pain that is often being carried around in the hearts and minds of everyday people.

On its continued crusade to help save lives is Seguin's non-profit organization Precious Life. Lorraine Turner, who serves as not only the vice-president but as one of the counselors for the program, says suicide is real. She says suicide is the type of death that isn't reported daily by the media nor shared publicly by the person's family. Nonetheless, she

says these lives are being lost each

"Unfortunately, they don't break it down by city. They break it down by state mostly and here on average, one person every two hours dies by suicide in the state of Texas. It is the 11th leading cause of death in Texas. Now, these statistics are of course from 2019. They have to wait until they get all data in and so we are always like two years behind. Even though something may happen in 2020, we won't get updates and statistics until 2021 or even 2022," said Turner.

Elections Office recognizing National Voter Registration Day

(Seguin) - Today is National Voter Registration Day. Helping to ensure that you are ready and prepared to head to the polls this Nov. 2 is Guadalupe County Elections Administrator Lisa Hayes. Hayes says this holiday serves as a reminder to voters to register so they can exercise their right to vote on Election Day.

Hayes says in celebration of National Voter Registration Day, the Guadalupe County Elections Offices in Seguin and Schertz will open early and close later to afford you -- the voter -- the flexibility to register today from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

"A lot of voters want to come out. They want to vote. They want to make their voices heard and that makes us so happy because we are essentially putting a party for 113,000 people and we want as many as possible to come out and vote but an absolute crucial step to the voting process is to register to vote. The benefit of today being National Voter Registration Day is it is a reminder to the voters that 'hey, you all need to come out to register to vote in order to actually come out and vote.' And, we are always happy to have voters come in and register



no matter what time of the year it is so to make that easier, what we are doing is we are opening early and staying open late. We are mirroring election day hours. We are going to be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. So, if there are voters out there who work 8 to 5 and who can't get to the election office during their work hours, well now, we are going to stay open today from 7 to 7 so voters can stop in on their way to work. They can stop in on their way home, register to vote and get that taken care of so they are good to go when we start early voting on Oct. 18. It's just on this day. This is the holiday and that's what we are going to do

in celebration of the holiday. We are going to be here from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and we'll be getting our voters registered so they can come out to the polls," said Hayes.

Hayes says National Voter Registration Day is a civic holiday geared toward celebrating our democracy in a nonpartisan manner. Timed to precede the voter registration deadline of Oct. 4, 2021, for the November 2, 2021, election,

the flexibility to register from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

"If voters would like to call and check on their registration status, they can call us at 830-303-6363, or go to the Texas Secretary of State's website VOTETEXAS. GOV and check their registration status online," said Hayes.

Hayes says her office is committed to doing all that it can to not only remind voters but to ensure that they are ready.

"Early Voting for November 2, 2021, Constitutional Amendment Election begins on Oct. 18, 2021, and runs through Oct. The Early Voting 29, 2021. Schedule and locations are available on the Guadalupe County Elections website. Sample ballots can be picked up at either Elections Office. They will also be available on our website by the end of the week. Voters can expect to see eight Constitutional Amendments on their ballot, as well as races for any local entities in which the voter resides that are holding elections," said Hayes.

The addresses for the county's elections offices include 215 S. Milam in Seguin and 1101 Elbel in Schertz.

Often dubbed as "accidents," Turner believes that we all have a responsibility in helping others in crisis.

"If you have a person that has come out or has even attempted suicide and you know that it is very present in your home, we tell them don't lose hope. Don't feel that you are a failure that it is something you have said or done or have neglected to do. It has nothing to do with you. Right now, the focus is on that person. So, what can you do to help them? It is to be there when they are wanting to talk. Be there. I was telling this one person, when your husband is talking to you, you need to put down the phone, turn down the TV, turn your body facing them and listen to them with every ounce of your being. Listen to them. Don't offer advice just listen. Some people just need people to be there to just hear - hear what they are going through, to understand their pain. If you know a person is suicidal, put away things that you know they can harm themselves with and let them know that they are not in this by themselves - that your pain is my pain and we are going to work through this together," said Turner.

Turner says getting them to recognize they need help is perhaps the hardest challenge. However, for those who step up to the plate, Turner believes there is hope especially if the rest of us take full note of what is clearly at stake.

"Go to the counseling sessions with them because again, it takes a village to save one person. If your child, spouse is going through something at the home, you all need to become educated and show them that they are not walking this path alone – that we are all walking it with you and when you need to talk, I'm going to be here. Drop what you are doing. What's more important to save a life or be texting or playing a game on your



phone or watching the latest football game when someone wants to talk to you because that will haunt you later. They came to me, and I wasn't there for them. That will haunt you later but get educated," said Turner.

Turner says unfortunately, suicide is so hidden, that it often comes as a surprise to those who are left behind. She says there are no limits or boundaries for suicide. She says if it wants to, it will find you.

"Since 1994, Precious Life Crusade Teen Suicide Prevention – that is our name – we kind of minimized to Precious Life Services because we do a lot more than just suicide prevention. We deal with things that lead up to suicide – things that are like triggers. It can be depression. It can be anxiety. It can be stress. We deal with a lot of other issues but our main goal is suicide prevention and we do target more with children because that's what started our organization - a 12-yearold boy that committed suicide and his parents said he was an A student, was on the football team, had a good support system as far as family and friends but yet, he took his life and that kind of stunned the community. We have taken it upon ourselves to educate the community around us whether it be just a family or it can be the police officers, the sheriff's office – whoever wants to be educated on what the signs are and what can they do to help someone not kill themselves," said Turner.

Turner says observing this month

as National Suicide Prevention Month is more than ceremonial. She says it's about helping to change the conversation around suicide.

"This is what I tell people who don't take suicide prevention and suicide intervention serious. When we lose one person, that is too many. We shouldn't be losing anyone to suicide and yes, we can not stop everyone suicide but think about the ones that we can stop – the people that do reach out and say, 'I need help.' So, they are living isolated, and depression is setting in and some people would rather just check out than to reach out and so we need to just be educated and aware and have a heart," said Turner.

Turner says it's important that the local community know about the outreach available through Precious Life. She says although you may not need it today, you can never be too sure about tomorrow.

"It's all about life. Life is so precious and we as a community, we need to collectively come together. They have a saying that it takes a village to raise a child well it takes a whole community to help people survive no matter what they are going through because most people that kill themselves, they really don't want to die, they really just want help because they can't see the pain. They can't see past their circumstances that they are going through whether it's a break-up or a loss of a loved one and so that's what we want to do here at Precious Life. We want to educate people. We have training classes. We have workshops and we do 101 if people just want to come in and want to learn - what can I do to help myself or help others. We are not a hotline but if you call our number and need someone to talk to, we have the National Suicide Prevention/Intervention Hotline which is 1-800-273-8225," Turner.

Texas Lutheran (7-6, 1-2 SCAC) hits the road on Wednesday to visit Huston-Tillotson at 7 p.m.









500 Female Athletes Urge Supreme Court To Reject Mississippi Abortion Law

(Washington, DC) -- More than 500 current and former female athletes are urging the U.S. Supreme Court to reject Mississippi's abortion law that would prohibit abortions after 15 weeks of pregnancy. The amicus brief the athletes filed this week cites what they call the importance of "bodily integrity and decisional autonomy" to their individual careers and women's sports in general. Women signing the brief include U.S. Women's Soccer star Megan Rapinoe [[ra-PEE-no]], and WNBA veterans Sue Bird, Breanna Stewart, and Diana Taurasi [[ta-RAH-see]]. The Supreme Court will hear oral arguments on the Mississippi law in December.

CDC Director: Boosters Available To All High Risk Workers

(Newton, MA) -- CDC Director Rochelle Walensky says she's strongly in favor of booster shots for those who work in high risk environments since millions of Americans are still unvaccinated. Speaking on CBS' Face the Nation, Walensky cited those who work in health care, prisons and in the general public like schools, grocery stores and restaurants. She noted younger people are also eligible depending on their jobs. Walensky said right now the recommendation calls for booster shots for those over 65 and high risk workers. She added they are still looking at the data when it comes to wide spread boosters for the entire American population.
