

893 pinwheels, what does each mean?

Guadalupe County Children's Advocacy Center shares insight into the local abuse of children

(Seguin) – Now that you have had days in which to travel by those patches of pinwheels planted in areas across Guadalupe County, it's finally time to uproot the significance of each one.

On April 1, the Guadalupe County Children's Advocacy Center set up batches of 893 pinwheels each at 15 locations across the area. The 893 recognizes the number of children served by the advocacy center in 2021. The awareness effort is done annually in observance of April as Child Abuse Prevention and Awareness Month.

Christy Williams, the executive director of the advocacy center, says the pinwheels help to illustrate the number of children abused and neglected and the service that was provided to each victim this past year at the local nonprofit program.

"Each one of those pinwheels at each site signifies one child who came through the doors of the children's advocacy center to receive specialized services from our center whether that be a forensic interview or counseling services, their supportive family members have come and gotten resources and an advocacy session of support and ongoing advocacy calls. Every single one of those kids is part of a case that was then just staffed at our monthly case review meetings to ensure that all of their needs are being met and they are not falling through the cracks so those are all the children that came through our doors last year," said Williams.

Williams says unfortunately the COVID-19 pandemic did little to protect children. She says, instead, it showed the community that abuse only transforms its shape.



Guadalupe County applauds the daily heroic efforts of 9-1-1 dispatchers

(Seguin) -- Guadalupe County is applauding the efforts of a group of heroes that often times goes unnoticed but is the first group of people you think of when there is an emergency.

The Guadalupe County Commissioners Court recently recognized its 9-1-1 dispatchers as part of National Telecommunicators Week.

Showing his appreciation for these men and women before the court was Guadalupe

County Sheriff Arnold Zwicke. Zwicke says his dispatch center is the heartbeat of any agency and is what initiates those life saving measures during a medical or public emergency.

"Today, we honor, and we can't just thank them enough for the job they do, the difference they make when someone calls in needing help. They are our unsung heroes that don't receive that recognition except for once a year unfortunately," said Zwicke. In celebrating their hard work, Zwicke applauded the dispatchers and their 67 years of total experience in emergency dispatch services.

"To give you a little bit of history of Oct. 20 through Sept. 2021, last budget year, 22, 011, 911 calls. That's a total of 16, 973 calls for service also dispatching constables, fire departments, highway patrol, game wardens and whoever else may cross through our county. So far this budget year, they have had 1,719 911 calls and 8,101 calls for service," said Zwicke.

Each of the dispatchers were invited and publicly recognized at a recent meeting of the Guadalupe County Commissioners Court. Each employee also received a small gift as a token of appreciation from the Guadalupe County Sheriff's Office. Recognition of dispatchers is held each year during the second week in April.

Guadalupe County honors animal control officers

(Seguin) – An expression of sincere thanks and appreciation is being extended this month to the employees of Guadalupe County's Animal Control program. As part of National Animal Care and Control Appreciation Week, the program's four employees and set of volunteers are being honored for their often times difficult task of protecting the public along with the helpless animals and pets that are rescued from injury, disease, abuse and starvation.

Acknowledging their contributions in the safety of all citizens was Guadalupe County Sheriff Arnold Zwicke who recently honored this team before members of the Guadalupe County Commissioners Court.

Zwicke says not only do they work long hours of service, but they do so while delivering the most efficient level of customer service.

"I can't say enough about these guys. These are guys are probably the most loved, the most hated people in Guadalupe County depending on which side of the fence you are on, and I think a lot of it is people thinking with their heart and not their head. These guys have to follow state laws. They have the unpleasant job of having to put down dogs sometimes. They do a tremendous job working with not only the dogs that we have in the ordinance but also the livestock, the wildlife – all the different calls that they may encounter each and every day, so I want to thank them and take time to recognize them today," said Zwicke.

He says not only is the county growing but so is the number of times in which they put themselves in potentially dangerous situations to protect the health and welfare of animals and the public.

"We are here today to represent 35 years of experience in the animal control service. To give you an example of what goes on, last budget year -5,458 calls for service, 508 animals were impounded, 118 redeemed by owner and 373 adopted and rescued which is a 97 percent adoption, redemption rate which is awesome. So far this year, 2,616 calls for service, 293 impounded animals, 67 owner redeemed and 210 adopted or rescued and so far this year, a 95 percent adoption and redemption rate," said Zwicke.

Personally recognized for their service to the county were Supervisor Doug Pyatt; Officer Wayne Seidel; Officer Jakob Boone and Officer Alex Jones. A pair of volunteers who also assist in the animal services' daily operations were also recognized for their contributions.

"At the beginning of the pandemic, we started seeing different types of cases. Instead of our usual child sexual abuse and child physical abuse which we see the vast majority of our cases, we started seeing results of 911 calls or hospitalizations or ER visits, so we started seeing more domestic violence cases, more broken bones, drug endangered children, people who are riding in vehicles with people under the influence. Those were the kinds of cases that we started seeing while the country was shut down and people were sent home," said Williams.

Williams says the years of staying within our homes was challenging especially for her team of professionals who did the best that it could of staying on top of the abuse and ensuring that kids were being protected as much as possible.

"And then once the children started coming back out of their homes and doing summer camps and especially when they returned back to school, that's when we started seeing a huge influx of sexual abuse cases and physical abuse cases that were taking place during that time where everybody was told to stay home. So that was a struggle for our staff knowing the trends of the types of cases that we see day in and day out knowing that those cases were not coming in but absolutely knowing that there's no way that that just magically just stopped

happening in our community was a great concern and then to have those really difficult cases of people who sometimes were badly injured or were in some serious danger of death just be the shift during that time was really difficult for our staff and our own mental health as we are walking alongside everyone in this community with the pandemic and the unknown with that and now we are also taking on this kind of shift in those kinds of cases," said Williams.

She says this past year especially proved very tough for some of our youngest and most vulnerable citizens.

"When the kids started going back to school, I guess we started seeing a lot more of our sexual abuse and physical abuse cases and we still see the gamut of all of them and have had some pretty serious domestic violence and gun related cases over the past year or so but this 893 is definitely more in line with our pre-pandemic norms. We definitely have seen more kids in this last year than we did in the previous two years," said Williams.

Among the 15 locations hosting pinwheels are the Guadalupe County Courthouse; Texas Lutheran University at Hwy. 46; Faith Lutheran Church, McQueeney Baptist Church, Veterans Memorial Park, Cibolo Soccer Fields, the Schertz Police Department and the First Presbyterian Church in Seguin.

Those wishing to join the fight against child abuse are encouraged to sign-up as a Champion for Courageous Children. The campaign is a fundraising effort for the advocacy center. Those wishing to get started are asked to text GCCAC to 44-321. They can also call 830-303-4760.

The pinwheels will remain planted through Monday, May 2.

McDonough wins high jump as No. 25 Texas Lutheran wraps Charles Austin Classic

(San Marcos) - The No. 25 Texas Lutheran men's track and field team wrapped up the Charles Austin Classic on the campus of Texas State University on Saturday.

Caimen McDonough won the high jump with a mark of 1.92 meters beating teammate Gerrit Twitero by a mere hundreths of a meter to take the win. Both Bulldogs now sit in third place in the SCAC with the 1.92-meter mark. Niko Rios finished fifth in the long jump with a 6.78m mark.

Bryce Powell-Chimene finished second in the 400-meter dash at 51.25 seconds - Powell-Chimene moves into ninth in the conference ahead of next week's Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) Championships.

Elijah Jefferson ran the 200-meter dash in 11.14 seconds to finish 13th but, with that time, he would move into third in the SCAC as of this writing.

Scottie Reyes would finish fourth, first amongst Division-III competitors, in the discus throw with a mark of 46.41-meters. Chase Cook threw a season-best 41.45m in the discus to move into third in the conference in the event.

Zachary Herman and Scottie Reyes, who owned the top two spots on the SCAC Leaderboard in the hammer throw entering this weekend, both topped their marks from the Carl Kight Invitational to further cement themselves as the top two in the event entering the conference championship meet next week. Herman finished fifth overall with a mark of 51.23-meters while Reyes would finish sixth with a 49.10 mark.

"For both the men and women, we treated this meet as a tuneup for the Conference Championships next weekend," TLU head coach Darlene Holland said. "We saw a few PRs and are ready for more PRs at conference."

TLU women close out Charles Austin Classic

(San Marcos) - The Texas Lutheran women's track and field team wrapped up the Charles Austin Classic on the campus of Texas State University on Saturday.

Leilani Lopez and Sirena Gomez each collected a top ten finish in the 100-meter dash with times of 12.87 and 12.97 seconds respectively to finish in eighth and tenth place. The Texas Lutheran sprinters would finish in ninth and tenth place in the 200m dash.

Kristin Lucero and Caeli Taylor would finish sixth and ninth in the 1500m run with times of 5:13.51 and 5:21.01.

Brenna Iannelli ran a season-best 1:08.84 in the 400m hurdles to move into third in the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) as of this writing.

In throws, Maya Flax and Courtney Burnett moved into the top 10 in the SCAC in the shot put with marks 10.48m and 9.87m. As of this writing, the Bulldogs reside in seventh and eight place respectively in the conference. Gizelle Gutierrez scaled the SCAC leaderboards to move to seventh in the discus (33.29m) and fifth in the hammer (36.97m) following her marks at the Charles Austin Classic. Freshman Ariana Owens threw a personal best 28.96-meters in the javelin throw to move into fifth overall in the conference in the event.

Maurine is survived by her daughter, Beverly Millington; granddaughter, Carey Millington; grandson, Cook Millington; and many friends and family.



Both jelly beans and chocolate have ingredients that are toxic to dogs. Symptoms normally occur between roughly four and 24 hours after being consumed, but treatment may be needed right away.

Veterinary Burnout Due To Pandemic

(Sacramento, CA) -- The pandemic is causing burnout and health concerns to those in the medical field, including veterinarians. Pet owners increased substantially during the pandemic, especially the first year. It's reported that about twenty-three million people adopted a pet during that time. With people home, they paid more attention to their pets so things like coughing or other symptoms were noticed. Veterinarians became overworked and understaffed. They dealt with fatigue and empathy overload. As a result, the Veterinary Mental Health Initiative was organized. It offers free support and mental health care to vets across the country. Since 2020, over 200 vets and technicians have benefited from the initiative.
