Voters approve one of two bond propositions on Seguin ISD ballot

Baseball, softball complex FAILS during Tuesday's election

(Seguin) - The Seguin ISD today is celebrating the outcome of only one of its two propositions that appeared before voters during Tuesday's election.

Voters in the Seguin ISD voted in favor of Proposition A, which included \$131 million of new and improved facilities district-wide. Many of those same voters, however, turned down Proposition B which included the district's desire to build a new \$7.5 million baseball and softball complex on the Seguin High School campus.

The results of the election were 6,991 votes in favor of Proposition A and 6,492 votes against it. Seguin ISD Superintendent Dr. Matthew Gutierrez says although he would have liked the approval of both propositions, he is thrilled to celebrate the approval of the district's largest bond issue ever.

"I think it certainly says a lot that our community believes in the work that we are doing in Seguin ISD. For the number of



voters that came out to show their support for over 130 million dollars of new facilities and updates, and upgrades is certainly indicative of the support that we have from our community, so I'm very thankful for that support, and our

Meanwhile, Gutierrez does admit that things would have been incredibly challenging if Proposition A failed.

"All too often, fast-growing school districts are having to play catch up in going out for bonds to address the growth that has caught up to them. And what this will afford us the opportunity to do is stay ahead of that — to be able to build a McQueeney elementary that can accommodate 800 plus students, to allow us to be able to address the replacement of Weinert down the road, to complete phase two of the Jefferson Elementary renovations as well as looking to add space to transportation. As more families move into the district, there's going to be a need for additional buses and additional drivers. There's going to be a bigger interest in agricultural science, and so they'll be able to have the facility to be able to accommodate that program, which we have not been able to do because we've not ever had an ag science facility...." Familiar face to return to seat on Seguin City Council

(Seguin) - A former council member will be returning to his seat on the Seguin City Council. Jim Lievens, during Tuesday's election, defeated challenger Darius Gil for the city council District 3 position. Lievens received 544 of the votes cast, while Gil received only 306 votes.

Lievens says he appreciates the voter support and is excited about continuing his work with the city.

"I'm excited to be on city council again. I want to make a difference. I'm available; I'm approachable. If any citizen — it doesn't even have to be in my district, I have that track record — doesn't have to be in my district, if you have a question, you



have a comment, call me, talk to me. I will help you. I will respond to you," said Lievens.

Lievens says he especially wants to extend a thank you to Gil for running a clean and fair campaign.

"My hat goes off to Darius. He had an excellent team behind him. They ran a really good campaign," said Lievens.

Lievens and Gil both threw their name in the hat after current Councilman Chris Aviles opted not to seek re-election.

Before Aviles, Lievens says he had been elected to serve the one-year term left behind by Phil Seidenberger, who died while in office. It was upon seeking reelection that he then lost the race to Aviles. He now returns four years later for a full term.

Marion ISD voters turn down \$50 million bond issue at zero cents

(Marion) - Marion ISD voters have turned down yet another bond issue. The voters on Tuesday said no to a \$50 million bond issue that was proposed at zero cents. That means, been approved, the bond issue would not have increased the current tax rate.

Voting against the bond were 2,078 voters. Only 1,412 voters were in favor of the plan.

The district endured the same fate this past when spring voters turned down a \$39.3 million issue bond for enhancements,

particularly at the high This school. latest bond called for similar renovations at the high school along with safety and security measures needed across district.

Disappointed by the results was Marion ISD Superintendent Dr. Don Beck, who accepts partial blame for not ensuring voter confidence.

"The voters spoke. There's a lot of them that voted this time around being a November election, and the one thing you can look at the gap did narrow a little bit. So, one thing I feel I

need to do is get more of the voters out there and get the message out to them. Obviously, I didn't reach enough of them," said Beck.

He believes one of the other challenging pieces was the language used on the ballot item that still referred to the item as a tax increase, although this bond, again, had no impact on the tax rate.

"I think that's part of it, and then just the language on the ballot is confusing — that the legislature put on there. But it's one of those things, just more

education and really and truly just to show the needs, and if this is what the community didn't think were needs for the district, then we either need to communicate that better or better articulate what needs are needed to move forward," said Beck.

Beck says although voters turned down this latest effort to accommodate future growth and to secure its buildings, it will not prevent the district from looking the road in hopes of finding solutions to its pending needs.

Seguin City Council District 8 race heads to a run-off

(Seguin) -- The race for Seguin City Council District 8 is headed to a run-off. Unable to clinch the required 50 percent of the vote needed to claim the seat outright were top votegetters Bill Keller and Eddie Davila Jr.

Keller led the race the entire night, finishing off with 682 of the votes cast. Davila followed behind with 635 votes. A third candidate Steven Berger finished off the race with 192 votes.

While he didn't anticipate to be still campaigning, Keller says he is ready to pick up where he left off.

The beautiful thing is — Steve Berger, I spoke with him earlier — and he's going to fully support me in this runoff. So, I'm looking forward to that and working with him to get us across that finish line along with him and his supporters," said Davila.

Berger was unable to be reached for comment following Tuesday's results.

Both Keller and Davila look to replace current Councilman Mark Herbold who, due to term limits, was unable to seek re-election.

Seguin ISD to welcome its newest member of its board of trustees

(Seguin) - There is new representation on the Seguin ISD Board of Trustees. Josh Bright successfully claimed the District 7 seat from Incumbent Glenda Moreno during Tuesday's election. Bright led the race the entire night - ending with 835 of the votes cast. Moreno trailed behind with 726 votes, followed by a third candidate Steve Turner who received only 659 votes.

Bright, who currently has children in the Seguin ISD, says he is appreciative to all those who have stood behind him and who he knows will continue to support him as he works for the best interest of all students.



"I'd like to thank my wife, Claire and my family and my friends, my neighbors, and my district for supporting me and having faith that I will make a positive impact on the

future of our children. I know the other two candidates are equally as passionate about Seguin ISD, and I hope they will continue their support in other areas. I do look forward to working alongside the other board of trustees — Dr. Gutierrez and the stakeholders to make sure that the path the district is on is the best for our children," said Bright.

Both Moreno and Turner were unavailable for comment following Tuesday night's results. Bright is slated to assume the seat following the canvassing of the official election results by the Seguin ISD. That is anticipated for later this month.



Navarro ISD voters select four representatives for the board of trustees

(Geronimo) - Two incumbents and two newcomers ended up earning a seat on the Navarro ISD Board of Trustees. A total of eight candidates were vying for one of the four available spots on the school board.

Incumbents Donna Gilliam and Hank Dietert led the race as the top vote-getters. Gilliam earned 2,243 of the votes cast, while Dietert picked up 1,865 votes. Securing the next two available seats were Lacey Gosch with 1,483 votes and Dan Reinhard with 1,188 votes.

Gilliam says she is proud to serve the Navarro ISD and looks forward to another term in office.

"I just wanted to thank the voters of Navarro ISD for reelecting me to another four-year term. I look forward to continuing to serve and to be a voice for the district. Together with the other



board members, I will continue to listen to the community and address the growth, safety and security, teacher morale, and pay and expanding programs for all students," said Gilliam.

Dietert says he also thanks the voters for their support and looks forward to continuing his work on the school board.

"I'm very thrilled that the community has supported me and supported Donna as well, and the other candidates that want to be on the board. But I'm really happy to hear that they believed in us and supported us. And for me, it's an honor," said Dietert.

As for Reinhard, he says he is especially excited to serve the students, staff, and families of the Navarro ISD and is looking forward to this new experience.

"I'm very excited. It's been a long, fun evening to watch it all happen, and I'm just excited to get in there and see what we can do, said Reinhard.

Comments from Gosch were unavailable following Tuesday night's late results.

Rounding out the rest of the race in the Navarro ISD were the other four remaining candidates. They included Eric Monkerud with 1,163 votes, Dru Canion with 787 votes, SeanLuc Tubre with 731 votes, and Tank Malinovsky with 535 votes.

So, this is really going to allow Seguin ISD to stay ahead of that growth and be proactive rather than having to play catch up in having to invest in portables and having to find temporary space in different areas," said Gutierrez.

Again, unlike Proposition A, voters could not stand behind the district's attempts to build a new baseball and softball complex on the south end of the high school campus. The final results in that race were 7,969 votes against Proposition B followed by only 5,489 votes in favor of the new sports complex.

Despite voters turning down the plans for the facility, Gutierrez recognizes that the needs of the program have not gone away. Yet, he is confident that they will be addressed in the future.

"It is certainly disappointing, and I think about those current athletes and future athletes that have big dreams for that facility, and so my heart certainly goes out to them. And I know that they were out on their own time — weekends, evenings, mornings really trying to get the word out, but we were unable to attain the support for that facility. So, I'm going to have to regroup and get with my team and come up with some ideas for moving forward along with the athletic director and share those recommendations with the board of trustees, get their input, but we're not going to give up. We're going to continue to work to ensure that we finish the entire high school package that includes baseball and softball. So somehow, some way, we're going to find a way to accommodate those two programs," said Gutierrez.

He says, ultimately, the district wants to have all extracurriculars on-site at the high school.

"We wanted to be able to especially accommodate our baseball players who have not had the luxury of having a baseball field on the campus. And,

of course, they lose out on a lot of times with the travel to and from the baseball field, but I want our athletes and their parents, and future athletes and future parents to know that these discussions are going to continue. I'm not sure exactly which direction we are going to go, but it's still going to be a priority. Right now, the community made that decision, and they did not support it. They did not make it a priority, so we have to determine what the best course of action is because we believe in the importance of students being connected to school through extracurricular programs such as baseball and softball, so we are going to come back to the table, and we will keep our community updated as we make progress through those plans," said Gutierrez.

Despite its best efforts, Gutierrez still applauds the voters for coming out and showing their support.

"I'm very thankful for our community coming out and showing their support. I know it is a very unique time for school districts to go out for bond referendums during a time when we are experiencing inflation, and the fact that the community came out and showed their support certainly means a lot to me. And for our students, this is a huge win. It's the largest bond that Seguin ISD has gone out for, and so I'm thankful for the community for coming out and showing their support for Proposition A," said Gutierrez.

District officials say now that voters have spoken, plans will be put into motion as soon as possible for the projects included in the \$131 million bond package. Those plans that have been echoed these last couple of months include a new McQueeney elementary campus, the creation of an Agricultural science facility, renovations to Jim Barnes Middle School, and the expansion of the district's transportation department.

Additional items found in the bond package are district-wide security measures, roof replacements, the purchase of 18 to 20 school buses, technology infrastructure, plumbing and HVAC upgrades, land for future use, school furniture, and security.

Texas Lutheran to Face Chicago in First Round of NCAA Tournament

SEGUIN, Texas -- Texas Lutheran volleyball has been selected for its third appearance in the NCAA Tournament after earning the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference's automatic qualifier by winning their first SCAC Championship on Saturday. The bracket was revealed Monday afternoon on ncaa.com.

The Bulldogs will travel to Claremont, California, for the opening three rounds starting on Thursday, November 10. Claremont-Mudd-Scripps - the national No. 1 seed - will play host to Texas Lutheran, Fontbonne, UC Santa Cruz, Chicago, Trinity, and Puget Sound.

TLU will face University of Chicago in the first round Thursday at 12:30 PM PST/2:30 PM CST. The Maroons enter the tournament with a 19-12 (5-2 UAA) record after winning the University Athletic Association (UAA) conference championship.

The Bulldogs head into the tournament 27-9 and 11-5 in SCAC play. The Bulldogs finished fourth in the SCAC before winning the SCAC Conference Tournament to earn one of the SCAC's two bids.

This will be the first NCAA Tournament appearance for Texas Lutheran under head coach Phyllis Fowler, the 2022 SCAC Coach of the Year, and the first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 2007. Texas Lutheran is 2-2 all-time in the NCAA Tournament - advancing to the Regional Final



in 2004, by defeating Christopher Newport and Trinity. All streaming and live stats links will be available on tlubulldogs.com.







Five States To Vote On Abortion-Related Ballot Measures

(Washington, DC) -- Voters in five states are weighing in on abortion-related measures in today's midterm elections. Vermont, California and Michigan will vote on constitutional amendments to protect abortion rights following the Supreme Court's decision to strike down Roe v. Wade earlier this year. Meanwhile, a measure in Kentucky would establish that the state constitution does not protect the right to an abortion. In Montana, a so-called "born alive" law will be on the ballot. The law would require medical care to be provided to infants born alive following a botched abortion.

Flu Cases Surge Early, Reaching Highest Hospitalization Level In Decade


(Atlanta, GA) -- Flu cases are surging early, reaching their highest hospitalization level in more than a decade. Health experts say it's not surprising. Masks are off, kids are back in school and we're getting together again, like we did before the COVID pandemic. The CDC says there are high levels of flu in the Southeast, especially in Alabama, South Carolina and Tennessee. There's also significant spread in New Jersey, Connecticut and eleven other states. Flu usually surges in December and January, but it's already been filling hospital beds in October and November. People 65 and up along with young children are most at risk.

RSV Overwhelming Hospitals

(San Antonio, TX) -- Flu cases always come this time of year and COVID is sticking around. However, what's slamming children's hospitals is a surge in a respiratory virus called RSV. Dr. Norman Christopher from the Children's Hospital of San Antonio says they're running out of rooms and putting some kids in the E-R. For the youngest kids, the symptoms of RSV are worse than COVID. The CDC says that, every year, an estimated 100 to 500 children die from complications.

"Love Hormone" May One Day Help Patients Recover From Heart Attacks

(East Lansing, MI) -- Oxytocin, the so-called "love hormone," may one day help patients recover from heart attacks. It's well-known that oxytocin fosters social connections and pleasurable feelings. But now, scientists at Michigan State University say they've shown that the hormone also stimulates stem cells to move from the heart's outer layer to the middle layer where they develop into muscle cells that trigger heart contractions. The researchers demonstrated that in zebrafish and human cell cultures and believe their findings could be used to promote regeneration of the heart following a heart attack.


