
By mid-April, more than 150 people had taken part in a meeting to learn more about Google Classroom.

The aims of LSSD Virtual are several:

- 1. Continue to provide high quality and diverse options for credit attainment and recovery to all students, regardless of location;
- 2. Deliver distance and blended learning opportunities to students throughout Living Sky, based on student interest and the expertise of staff throughout the division;
- 3. Build and strengthen relationships between schools in the division;
- 4. Foster inquiry and place-based learning opportunities for high school students through Brilliance Credits;
- 5. Assist students in building a portfolio of 21st Century skills, including technological certifications through ICTC, and
- 6. Offer flexible forms of delivery, suited to course content and location of staff expertise:
 - a. Synchronous Calculus 30 and Physics 30
 - b. Asynchronous Computer Science 20 and 30
 - c. Blended Psychology 20 and 30, Career and Workplace
 - d. Self-directed (Brilliance Credits) Our "Brilliance Project" provides a framework and support for students who would like to earn credits while pursuing their personal passions. Students will work with an on-site mentor to plan a proposal and timeline to research their topic and present their findings using a product of their choice.
 - e. Integrated (Blended PAA Units) 3D Printing and Design, Robotics & Automation, Communications, Media Streaming and Data Analysis can be used by schools to enhance PAA survey class offerings and facilitate student choice.
