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Timelines

- March 11 World Health Organization declares
 COVID-19 a pandemic
- March 18 Government of Saskatchewan declares a State of Emergency
- March 18- Government of Saskatchewan tables 2020-21 spending estimates without revenue forecasts, which were impossible at the time given the rapidly changing situation

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Unknown Variables

- Duration of emergency measures and public health orders
- Consumer spending habits
- Evolving suite of federal support programs
- Global travel and trade restrictions
- Success of global monetary and fiscal policy measures

- This will likely result in spending increases beyond the amounts allocated to the 2020-21 Estimates

Beyond 2020

- Saskatchewan was on track for surplus in 2019-20 and 2020-21 prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and oil price collapse
- 2020-21 deficit is not a structural deficit, it is a PANDEMIC DEFICIT
